Lesson 4: How To Prioritize

Learning Objectives:	To know why it's important to prioritize To learn how to do it

Useful resources if you can get them:

- A glass jar, big enough for the students to see
- Stones to fit in the jar
- Smaller stones to fill it up a bit more
- Sand
- Water

Starter: The 'Pickle Jar' theory

Use the resources above and/or explain it (see Resources below)

Introduction: Why is prioritizing necessary?

Discuss why we can't do everything we want to.

Development: What are your priorities?

Students could list and/or discuss two versions of this:

- 1. What their priorities are.
- 2. What they think their priorities should be.

Is there a difference between the two? Why?

Consolidation: How to Prioritize

Students brainstorm ways to decide what to do and when. Teacher could share how they personally prioritize. Would it be relevant for students?

Plenary: 'What will I do?'

Students write down three ways they could prioritize more effectively based on the answers that come from the previous activity.
